A huge Thank You goes to our new and returning officers for 2019:


Bill Charpier accepted the position as President and welcomes the opportunity to continue guiding our club and to preside over our October 6, 2019, 70th Anniversary Gala.

Octoauto, the other Overland

With more than 100 patents to his name, Milton O. Reeves is not exactly a household name. While working in a sawmill Reeves saw that workers were unable to control the speed of the saw causing split wood and



wastage of good lumber. After some trial and error Reeves invented a variable-speed transmission to control the speed of the blade. Several years later, along with his brothers, he purchased the Edinburg Pulley Co. In 1896 Reeves started building cars to test his variable drives but discontinued them to concentrate on his pulley business. In 1905 a customer ordered 500 Reeves air cooled engines, the deal fell through, and stuck with 500 engines he started to build cars again but quit in 1910.

Probably his most freakish patent was the Octoauto, an eight-wheeled car designed for a smoother ride on the

rough roads of the day. He purchased a 1910 Overland and set about adding an additional axel at both ends of the car. It was over 20 feet long and had a wheelbase of around 15 feet. It was displayed at the 1911 Indy 500 drawing lots of attention, but no orders. A well-known writer and philosopher, Elbert Hubbard wrote, "In the good old days when I used to take cattle to the Chicago Stock Yards,... my home was in the caboose for perhaps three day and nights. It was a sad day when,

instead of a regular caboose, they bundled the stockmen into a dinkey." Hubbard went on to tell how the caboose with its two wheels at each corner was smoother and more comfortable than the dinkey with only one wheel at each corner using that comparison to the superior ride of the Octoauto.





The following year, undissuaded by a lack of orders, Reeves removed one of the front axels and renamed his car the Sextoauto. He built an additional Sextoauto on a Stutz chassis. Neither design drew any interest and there is no record that he ever sold either design earning Reeves a place in automotive design history as one of the 50 worst cars ever built.

Reeves did however contribute a longer lasting and better known invention to automobile history, he invented the muffler.


Traveling Down the Road How We Get to Where We're Going.......

Cars need roads; hopefully ones that are smooth, correctly engineered, and safe to hold many types of vehicles, including automobiles over many years. People enjoy being able to get to their destination with the least possible inconvenience. Early colonial routes were mostly natural surfaces. They were built to compliment an extensive waterway system. Roads went where waterways couldn't go. As time passed, those roads made for horses and wagons became unacceptable. The federal

government became involved because they wanted to develop interior lands, defend remote territories and establish a national postal service.

In 1806 the federal government started construction of the National Road, the Cumberland Road, from the Potomac River at Cumberland, Maryland inland to the Ohio River at Wheeling, West Virginia. But by 1831, the money was gone, the road was turned over to the states and the federal government stopped all road funding. Local governments oversaw road construction because they had vested interest in them. Because of western immigration, by the late 1880s there were many established routes within and between cities. There were also routes for interstate and transcontinental travel.



With the bicycle movement of the late 1800's, (bicycles being mass-produced in 1890), the need for better roads was a must. The Good Roads Movement (late 1870s-1920s), was championed by those enthusiasts that found a need for better, safer roads on which to ride their bicycles. (Sound familiar – like the Rails to Trails movement led by walkers and bicyclists today.)

Thus, in 1893, the Office of Road Inquiry (ORI) within the Dept. of Agriculture was formed. It had a \$10,000 budget to be used to promote new rural road development.

Henry Ford's Model T was mass-produced in 1908. The acceptance of the automobile and the demand for it created an even bigger desire for better roads. The rural voters lobbied for paved roads Library of Congress photo of 1st and with the slogan:

10 Millionth Ford Automobile. (1924)

"Get the farmers out of the mud!".

The Federal-Aid Road Act of 1916 created the Federal-Aid Highway Program which funded state highway agencies so they could make road improvements. States had to create a state highway department, technically oriented, and managed according to principles of scientific management and administration. States matched federal funds dollar for dollar. The federal government did not provide money to local governments. The Federal-Aid Highway Program continues into the present day by

providing financial assistance for the construction, maintenance and operation of the Nation's 3.9 million-mile highway network, including the Interstate Highway System, primary highways and secondary local roads.

Unfortunately, our entrance into WWI changed our priorities, and upgrading the roads was not high on this list. But, as time moved on, The Federal Highway Act of 1921 transformed ORI into the Bureau of Public Roads. There was now funding for a system of two-lane interstate highways. More labor was available during the 1930s with Depression-era job programs. Subsequently, our involvement in WWII gave us better roads, but only where the military needed them. Therefore, this meant other roads fell into disrepair.

A few intercity highways were built in the 1930s through the 1950s, and a few cities had some limited-access, divided, multilane highways. It wasn't until 1956, when Congress enacted a plan to build and finance the National System of Interstate and Defense Highways, known as the Interstate Highway System, that freeways came into being. The system was to be 42,500 miles of four-lane divided highways with limited access throughout. Standard vertical and horizonal clearances were designed to support military vehicles, such as trucks carrying tanks. The federal government would pay 90% of the cost. This system was considered complete in 1990 and could only be enlarged if a state paid the cost, constructed it to their standards, and petitioned the federal government to have the route added.




In California, Interstate 80 is a primary route over the Sierra Nevada. For nearly 100 miles, this roadway transects the range. Construction on Interstate 80 in California began in 1956, following the signing of the Interstate Highway Act which was passed during the Eisenhower Administration. Construction through the Sierra occurred mostly in the early 1960s. The highway was not completed until 1964.

The U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) was established in 1966. The Bureau of Public Roads was renamed the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and became a part of DOT in April 1967.

We may take for granted all the roads we have today, but it took many years, much planning and money to provide such a wonderful system of paved surfaces that allow us to travel throughout our community, state and country.



The **National Highway System** (**NHS**) is a network of strategic highways within the United States, including the Interstate Highway System and other roads serving major airports, ports, rail or truck terminals, railway stations, pipeline terminals and other strategic transport facilities. Altogether, it constitutes the largest highway system in the world.

As NCRG-HCCA members we enjoy so many of the rural roads not shown on this map while we tour. But, we use many of the roads in this system regularly, in our daily life or while enjoying a vacation, or getting to some of those black-line highways.





A 1955 Wedding Ideas for YOUR 2019 Wedding

The bride and groom lead the celebration parade through Reno, NV from the church to the reception, in a 1905 Model "F" Ford. The procession included 16 additional cars ranging in age from 1908 to 1923.

The wedding theme was 1910 and the Nevada Regional Group of HCC wore authentic period costumes. The bride wore a 1910 era satin gown with full leg-o-mutton sleeves. The groom wore stripped morning trousers with ascot tie and swallow tailed coat, authentic to 1910 era.

After the reception the bride and groom drove off in a 1913 Ford.






A Day in Automotive History February 29, 1908

The Cadillac, a one-cylinder 1905 Model M Touring Car, was essentially the same car as those in the Royal Automobile Club Standardization Test that would elevate the status of American motor cars in general and validate the concept of interchangeable parts.

Technical Tip

Thanks to Garry Gunderson

On our drive to the last NCRG Board meeting in our modern car, it was raining most of the 60 mile trip. To my surprise, I could still see very clearly without using the wipers. I commented to Mary how incredible it was that the water beaded up and streamed right off the windshield.

Slanted windshields on newer cars are usually very difficult to see through without using wipers.

Then I remembered that I had recently changed brands of washer fluid to Rain-X Bug Remover, available for under \$3.00/gallon. I never expected that washer fluid could make such a difference.

In the past, I also used
Rain -X Anti Fog treatment inside
the flat windshield of our '36 Packard
and it worked great even in the coldest, rainiest
weather. We owned that Packard 35 years and I
never did install wipers on the car!



Valentine's Day Facts

St. Valentine's Day falls on February 14th of each year. Although the name is Saint Valentine's Day, most people refer to the day as Valentine's Day, or even the Feast of Saint Valentine. It was originally a day to celebrate Saint Valentinus, who performed weddings for soldiers who were not allowed to marry. He was imprisoned for this, as well as for ministering to Christians. Saint Valentinus wrote a letter to the daughter of his jailer before he was executed. His letter was signed 'From your Valentine'. He was buried on February 14th.

Valentine's Day was not associated with romantic love until the middle ages. By the 1700s in England it began to resemble the Valentine's Day we know today. At this time lovers began to express their love with gifts of flowers, candy and cards, which were called 'valentines'.

On Valentine's Day every year, there are at least 36 million heart-shaped boxes of chocolates sold.

Valentine's Day is the second most popular day of the year for sending cards, second only to Christmas. There are approximately 1 billion Valentine's Day cards exchanged every year in the U.S. alone. And, women tend to buy about 85% of them.

There are approximately 50 million roses given on Valentine's Day around the world. Approximately 27 % of those who buy flowers on Valentine's Day are women. The other 73% are men. Approximately 15% of women send themselves flowers on Valentine's Day.

There are enough candy hearts made each year to stretch from Valentine, Arizona to Rome, Italy, and back again. The number of these candy hearts produced is approximately 8 billion.

At least 9 million people buy their pets a gift on Valentine's Day.

The phrase to wear your heart on your sleeve has historical meaning. In the middle ages young people would draw the name of their valentine from a bowl. They had to wear the name on their sleeve for one week.
