




Celebrating the New Year

The earliest recorded festivities in honor of a new year's arrival date back some 4,000 years to ancient Babylon. For the Babylonians, the first new moon following the vernal equinox—the day in late March with an equal amount of sunlight and darkness—heralded the start of a new year.

Though the Babylonian New Year's celebration dated back about 4,000 years, the oldest continually celebrated New Year's holiday is the Lunar New Year, or Spring Festival, that began during China's Shang Dynasty about 3,500 years ago. (History.com)

While Italy, France, and Spain were among the countries that immediately accepted the new Gregorian calendar, Protestant and Orthodox nations were slow to adopt it. Great Britain and its American colonies did not begin following the Gregorian calendar until 1752. Before then they celebrated New Year's Day on **March 25**. Around the 1900s New Year's celebrations started. The first ball drop in Times Square was in 1907. (Encyclopedia Britannica)




